Science – Remember what it means to be living or nonliving? Take a walk around your home and make a list of as many living and nonliving things that you can find. Remember the rules to consider something living or nonliving.

Math – Design a scale drawing of your secret clubhouse. A scale is a proportion between two sets of measurements. When architects draw plans for a house, they cannot draw the plans the same size as the real house, because the plans would be too large. Therefore, they must scale the drawing to a smaller size. For example, your measurement scale would be that 2 inches= 1 foot.

As you create a scale drawing using a straightedge, be sure that your clubhouse meets the following criteria:

- 1. The ceilings are no higher than 10 feet.
- 2. The total perimeter cannot exceed 48 feet.
- 3. The clubhouse may be any shape.
- 4. Doors and windows must be at least 1 foot apart. Doors should be wide enough that furniture will fit through.
- 5. All walls, doors and windows must be drawn with a 90° angle, perpendicular to the floor.
- 6. The clubhouse should be drawn to scale and should be realistic and reasonable in size.
