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#### **FEBRUARY GREETINGS!**

We're excited to share that three of our schools were awarded individual \$2000 grants from the NJEA for Sustainable Jersey for Schools projects.

- \* Holland Brook School will direct this funding toward enhancing an outdoor classroom space, composting, and a water bottle filling station.
- \* Whitehouse School will fund a Green Club for students and install another water bottle filling station.
- \* Three Bridges School will enhance the school grounds with a pollinator garden and a rain garden that students will help plan, research, and implement.

#### PASSWORD MANAGEMENT TECH TIPS

Google, Microsoft, Yahoo, Twitter and Facebook - the list goes on and on. Many of us have online accounts and subscriptions to these and other popular websites. These sites often require separate logins and passwords that each user must manage and remember separately. As one can imagine, multiple login IDs and passwords can be a big challenge and sometimes very frustrating to organize and remember.

To help address this challenge, a number of free password management solutions are available. *LastPass* is one of these more popular password management services. *LastPass* utilizes a popular security technology called "salted hashing" that protects and secures all of your passwords online. With salted hashing, only the subscriber has access to their online information and security credentials.

Once a subscriber has set up an account with a password management service, they will have the option to add all their favorite websites, along with the login credentials needed to access those sites. Many of these sites also offer mobile apps and browser extensions that allow the users to easily and securely access their favorite websites on any device or platform.

Some additional features password managers offer include: Selective password sharing (useful for managing children's online credentials) secure password generation, and advanced website and credential organization. Save those sticky notes! Check out password managers to see if they fit into your needs and requirements to make your online presence more organized and secure.
