School Staffing Shortages and Job Fair

The country has been faced with a labor shortage. School districts across the nation are desperate for school bus drivers, cafeteria workers, and substitute teachers. Our district is no exception. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the National Association for Pupil Transportation, the National Education Association, and Education Week, the job opening rates for state and local education has increased 168% between July 2020 and July 2021. The shortage of certain staff has presented challenges for our district but we have developed plans in hopes of recruiting staff.

Back to School Success

You are your child's first teacher. Here are some helpful tips to continue their successful transition to the new school year.

- **Be organized.** Consider organizing your child's backpack the night before. Also, laying out clothes, collecting sports equipment and instruments, and packing lunch may make for a more peaceful morning.
- **Get plenty of rest.** Set and enforce regular weekday or weekend bedtimes. Establish regular bedtime routines and set an alarm or notification 30 minutes before bedtime. Remove tech devices from your child's bedrooms to focus them on sleeping.
- **Eat a good breakfast.** Students learn best when they are energized and can fully focus on their school work. Even if your child isn't interested in breakfast first thing in the morning, something small and healthy to eat will give them the energy they need until lunch time.
- **Engage in open communication with your child's teacher.** Communicate early and often. You and your child's teacher have the same goal. You both want your child to have a positive, successful school year.
- **Understand your child's curriculum.** All district curricula are posted on the district website. Familiarize yourself with the content so you can talk to your child about what they learn each day.
- **Devise a plan for homework.** Find a quiet place for homework, such as a "homework station." Remove distractions like TVs and video game consoles in the homework area. Help your child to prioritize their assignments by making to-do lists with deadlines. Give your child a short break after each assignment they finish.

Parents know their children best and have the privilege of setting the tone for the school day. This is an ideal time for schools and families to support each other and strengthen the school home connection.

Aavidum – Mental Health Curriculum

Readington continues its commitment to the social and emotional wellness of our students, staff and members of our community. One of the district’s strategic goals is to cultivate social awareness throughout our district family. The goal reads,

“Our learners will feel connected, valued, and secure in digital and non-digital learning environments cultivated by a shared sense of community. Every individual will develop skills that promote an awareness of self and others as well as the environment, including the ability to understand the impact of their decisions.”

A committee of expert district professionals in their field of education was assembled including administrators, school counselors, and teachers to map out actionable steps to achieve this lofty, but important goal. Together, we identified that the mental wellness of our students is a critical piece to this vision. So we began searching possible resources that would support the programs we already have instituted in our schools through our current Health and counseling curricula to address mental health.

A staff member from RMS reached out and shared that her son’s school created an “Aavidum” Club. After doing some digging into the program I came to discover that this was more than just a club. It was a school-wide commitment to the mental wellness of all students. Here is an excerpt from www.aavidum.com to provide some context. ***“Aavidum stands for, “I got your back.” This was created by a group of students after they lost a classmate to suicide. What started in one tiny school in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania has now become a nationwide movement.”***

After sharing this information with our school counselors, administrators and members of our school board and after hours of discussion, I am excited to announce the implementation of two mental health curricula for this school year: **Aavidum for students in grade 6-8 (To be launched in October) Little Aavidum for students in grades K-5 (To be launched in January and February)**

The Aavidum Program is designed to be co-taught by the Physical Education/Health Teacher along with the School Counselor. Sarah Pauch, Supervisor of Math, Science and Technology, and I collaborated to make sure the lessons outlined in this free program are in alignment with the current Health standards identified by the New Jersey Department of Education. Our Physical Education/Health Teachers and School Counselors are working closely together to coordinate and schedule the implementation of the Aavidum Program. Furthermore, an Aavidum Club has been established at Readington Middle School to support the amazing work taking place in our classrooms.

In conclusion, the intention behind this action step is to spread the word to every student that they are not alone and we always have each other’s backs here in Readington. Through these lessons, I hope that our students will feel empowered by understanding that it is ok and necessary to talk about mental health. The brave spaces that will be created by our incredible staff under the supervision of our expert school counselors, will hopefully provide students and adults the knowledge and language needed to talk about this complex, often uncomfortable, yet critically important topic that will stay with them for their entire lives.



Special Education Spotlight

Special Education Parent Advisory Group (SEPAG) - What is SEPAG?

A Special Education Parent Advisory Group (SEPAG) is a district level, parent driven group. The New Jersey Administrative Code for Special Education tells us that “each district’s Board of Education shall ensure that a special education advisory group is in place in the district to provide input to the districts on issues concerning students with disabilities.” While we have always hosted parent meetings, this group goes above and beyond. SEPAG is an independent volunteer group that works

collaboratively with the Readington Township Pupil Services Department. SEPAG is intended for anyone that has an interest in special education or has a child with an IEP that resides in Readington Township. Partnerships are formed by creating opportunities for parents to share information, network with other parents trying to handle similar situations and learn from each other’s advice, questions and experiences in a safe sharing environment. Some topics that SEPAG may address at meetings include:

- Disability awareness: ADD/ADHD, ASD, Down Syndrome, Physical Disability, Developmental Disability, Learning Disability
- Information on IEPs and 504s
- Related services: speech, occupational therapy, social skills, etc.
- Advocating for yourself and your family
- Community resources
- Reinforcing study skills at home
- Supporting students on the Autism Spectrum
- Addressing Anxiety and Depression
- Extended School Year (ESY)
- Positive Behavior Supports
- Effective Communication with Teachers
- IDEA: Understanding the Principles of Special Education
- Effects of Executive Functioning on Learning
- Social Emotional Learning
- Impact of COVID-19 on Learning

I welcome you to join Jessica March, the parent leader of SEPAG and me, the district liaison to SEPAG, to our first SEPAG meeting of the 2021-2022 school year on October 21st at 6:30 PM. 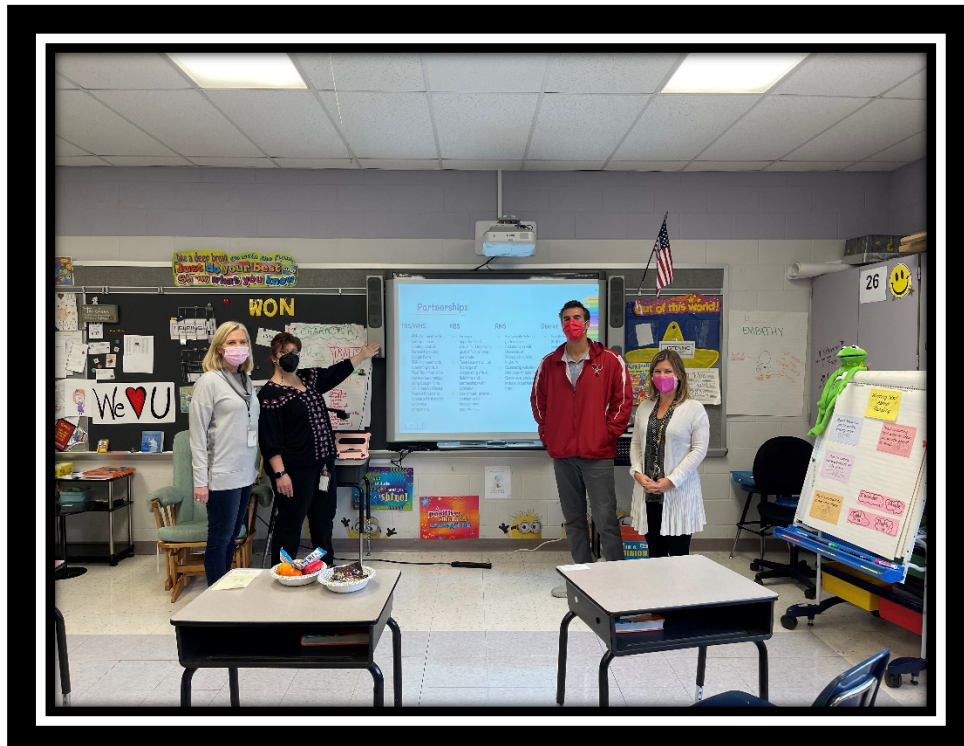
