- Prepare for enrollment increases from new housing developments
- Balance class size guidelines with scheduling efficiencies
- Enrich students' academic experiences
- Continue to implement the district's Strategic Plan
  - Inquisitive learning
  - Social awareness
  - Partnerships

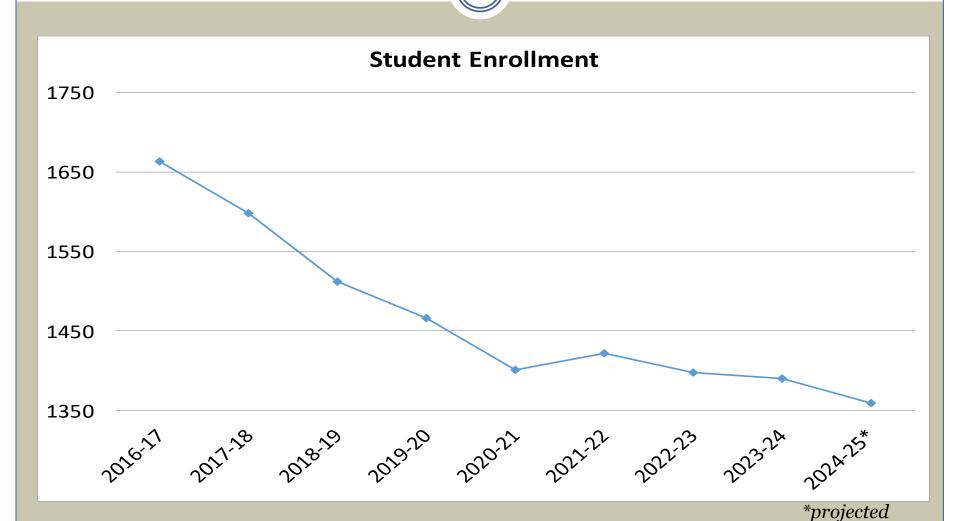
#### Enrollment Forecast for 2024-25

Anticipated 2024-25 K through 8 enrollment = 1359
Anticipated 2024-25 PreK enrollment = 215
Total 2024-25 enrollment = 1574
Anticipates 7 out-of-district students
Presumes 134 kindergarten students in district

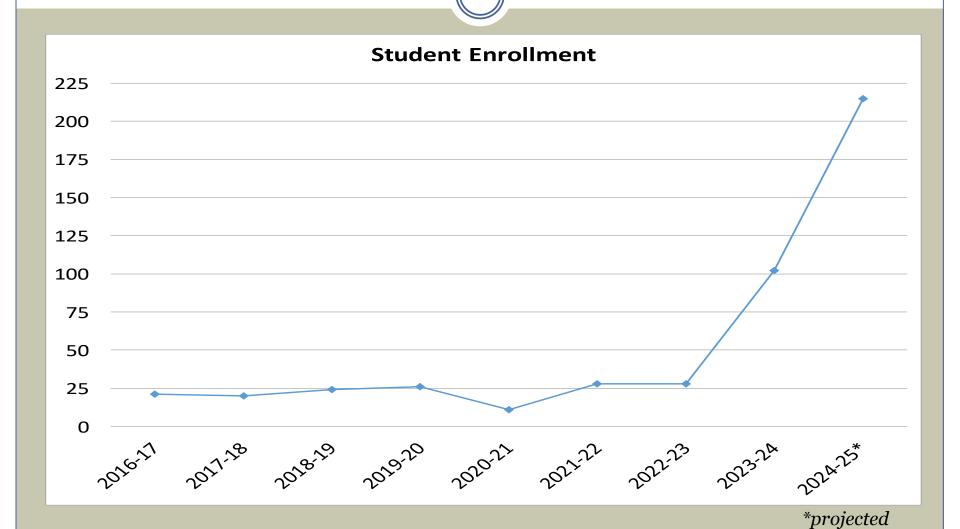
Current 2023-24 K through 8 enrollment = 1410
Current 2023-24 PreK enrollment = 102
Total 2023-24 enrollment = 1512
Includes 7 current out-of-district students

Enrollment figures include current students, but exclude any new students from the Ridge at Readington

#### Anticipated Elementary Class Size

### Personnel Highlights

- Additional behavioral health counselor, previously paid through ESSER
- Reconfiguration of 2 teaching staff positions through attrition
- Increased wages for police officers through shared services
- Increased wages for staff to better align with market conditions
- Recruitment and retention services and stipends
- Flexibility in athletics for design and creation of sports / clubs
- New schedule at the middle school and revised schedules at the elementary schools in conformity with the RTEA contract
- To adhere to new RTEA contractual obligations, stipends and extra-pay rates have been increased such as a \$1,000 stipend for paraprofessionals and increase in professional development and curriculum writing rates

## Preschool Expansion\*

- Free curriculum-based preschool for 3- and 4-year old children residing in Readington Township
- Addition of 2 full-time preschool teacher positions in-district
- Addition of 2 full-time paraprofessional positions in-district
- Reallocation of 1 full-time preschool teacher and 1 paraprofessional
- Creation of 2 full-time preschool community parent involvement specialist / relief teacher shared positions
- Creation of 1 full-time preschool instruction coach / intervention and referral specialist position
- Nurse stipends and extra-pays
- 11 certificated full-time teaching staff and 11 paraprofessionals at private providers through preschool expansion in partnership with Berry Patch, Global Pioneer / REN, Stanton Learning, Whitehouse Prep

### Curriculum/Pupil Services Highlights

- Continuation of self-contained special education classes and preschool disabilities program sections
  - Net savings for district compared to students being placed out-of-district
- Continuation of expanded Extended School Year programming
- Revised English language arts and math curricula to align with new state standards, purchase of new textbooks and materials for English language arts, math, science and world language
- Mental health services
  - Creation of new school counselor suites at Readington Middle School
  - Behavioral Health Counselor
  - Employee Assistance Program\*
- English language learners support through SEI\*
- Half day breakfast and lunch district-wide with low-income supports
- Continued implementation of the district's strategic plan

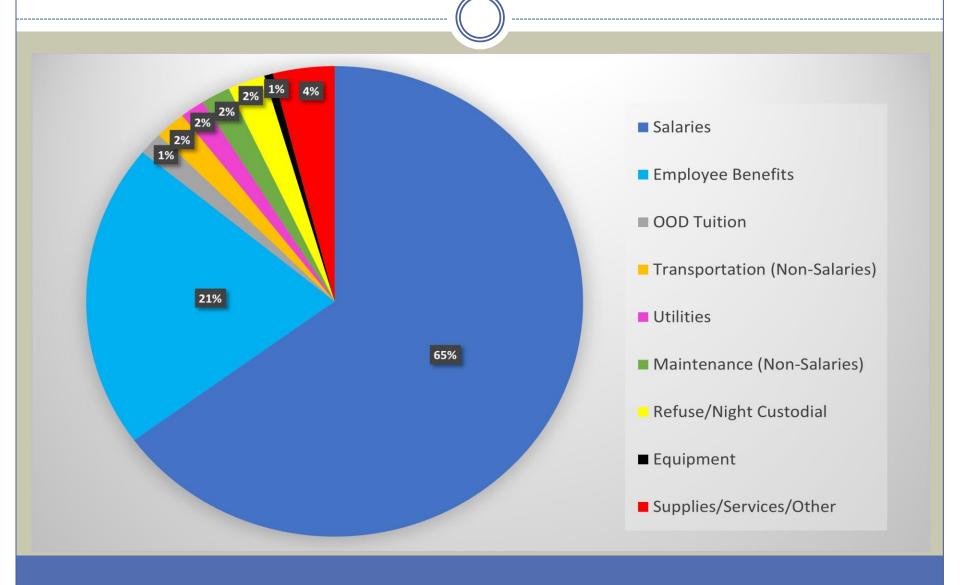
### Capital Projects

- Readington Middle School main office renovations to include: asbestos abatement, HVAC, roofing, and enhanced school counselor suites and nurse offices
- Refreshed preschool classrooms, bathrooms and curriculum supplies\*
- District-wide solar expansion\* and LED classroom lighting at Readington Middle School
- Core switches and access points replacement\*
- District-wide security upgrades in partnership with the Township of Readington/Police Department\*
- New art and computer room at Whitehouse School
- Playground enhancements at Whitehouse & Three Bridges School
- Softball and baseball field updates, fencing and signage

Projects are funded by existing reserves, not the local tax levy

\*Partially funded by state or federal grants, between 20-40% on average, or at no-cost (solar)
